Standing in Awe of the Nature

## Message from the Pulpit

Again, Love Mark 12:28-34 Sermon on September 22nd

When I was in Divinity School, a professor told me this. "When you teach something in 2 hours, you must prepare it for four hours. If you want to teach the same thing in an hour, you've gotta prepare it for 8 hours. Because you need to make it concise. And, if you want to summarize the same thing in one sentence, you must master it." Do you agree with it? Yes, it is true. In any subject, either business, history, or the Bible, whatever it will be, if you can summarize something in one sentence, you are a master of the area.

Today, Jesus received a question from one of the teachers of the law. V. 28, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?" If you summarize the whole Bible in one sentence, what would you say?

The teacher of the law who asked the question today seems to have a different purpose from the former visitors. The former visitors came to jeopardize Jesus with wicked, cunning plots. The first group was the chief priests, the teachers of the law, and the elders.

They came after Jesus flipped the table of the coin exchanger. The second group was the Pharisees and the Herodians, who came and asked a sensitive tax question. The third group was the

Jesus received a question from one of the teachers of the law. "If you summarize the whole Bible in one sentence, what would you say?"

Sadducees, who asked about the resurrection. Of course, Jesus answered all those questions, making them unable to say anymore. Then, today's teacher of the law is different. He didn't come to Jesus to trap him. Instead, he wanted to learn from Jesus. After listening to all the previous debates, the teacher of the law (today's main figure) was impressed with Jesus' wisdom and knowledge of the Bible. So, he asked Jesus a question that he couldn't solve. "What is the most important commandment in the Bible?"

The Old Testament contains 613 commandments based on the Ten Commandments. In Jesus' time, there was a debate about which commandment was the most important. The strongest opinion was worship and offering. No wonder. In that way, their market-front businesses, such as exchanging coins and selling doves, would be even more prosperous.

However, Jesus answered the question differently without hesitation. V. 29-31, "The most important one is this: 'Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. **Love the Lord your God** with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these."

**The first one**, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength," is Deuteronomy 6:4-5. Every Israelite knew this because they wrote this word, put it in a little box, and tied it on their forehead or wrist to remember it. "Love the Lord your God."

Our lives are decided according to what we love. We give our time, money, effort, and passion to something or someone we love. You know my second son, Teak, loves to play drums, right? When he was a high school student, my wife and I counted from the moment he returned from school: One, two, three, four, five. Drrrrrrrr.

When I dated my wife 25 years ago, we met at the church for early morning prayer at 6 a.m., ate breakfast, lunch, and dinner, studied together,

We give our time, money, effort, and passion to something or someone we love. walked on the street, and talked until the last bus came near her house about midnight. Most of the time, I passed out on the way, snoring hard. But, on the following day, we started all over again. Why? Because I loved her.

I know you have your own love stories, much more than I do. When we met our child or a grandchild, when we bought a dream house, or when we did something we liked (fishing, camping, golfing, knitting, playing Majong), we put in the time, money, effort, and whatever was needed. Why? Because we love it. It is so natural. No one forces us to do so. There's no regret in giving ourselves or our possessions.

It is also true when we love God.

It is also true when we love God. We want to spend more time with Him, chatting in prayer, singing in praise, giving our gifts,

and walking together in ministries. When I heard God's voice in prayer for the first time, my heart was full of love. I read the Bible for hours and hours because it was so sweet. I wanted to pray constantly, so I had to get in the car because I was afraid of people thinking I was weird if I prayed loud and long in the middle of the grocery or the street. It is natural when we love.

These days, I have seen many congregations come to church anytime (day and night) and devote their time and energy to the Lord, planting flowers, cleaning the classrooms, making brochures, joining ministries, and ringing the bells. You name it. We need some bunkbeds at church. Why do you do that? Because you love the Lord. Why are you here today? Because you love the Lord.

Love the Lord your God. Is this an obligation or a forced commandment? No, no one forces it. It doesn't work that way. We naturally love Him when we know who He is and how He has loved us. We may forget for a while how much love we received from God, how happy we were with God, and how many blessings we received when we devoted ourselves to Him. Sometimes, worldly desires may distract us. However, we all know deep inside our hearts that the true joy is in the Lord. Being loved is so good. But loving is even happier. And loving each other is the best.

Deuteronomy 10:13 says that God gave us the law (the Bible) **for our own good**. When we love God, everything will be in the perfect position. That's why St. Augustine said, "Love God and do whatever you please: for the soul trained in love to God will do nothing to offend the One who is Beloved." When we love God, every law will be kept naturally. Therefore, **love the Lord your God** with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength. That was the first one.

St. Augustine said, "Love God and do whatever you please: for the soul trained in love to God will do nothing to offend the One who is Beloved." And Jesus said **the second one** was, "Love your neighbor as yourself." It is from Leviticus 19:18 ("...love your neighbor as yourself. I am the Lord"). It was not new for the Israelites, either. Every Jew would have known it.

Let's look into it. Loving our neighbor has a detailed condition: "as yourself." Think about it. There is no commandment to love ourselves. Because everybody does it very well. When we feel cold, we clothe ourselves. When we feel hungry, we feed ourselves. We clean our bodies, brush our teeth, and entertain ourselves. We give skincare lotions on the face, eye cream, hand cream, foot cream, body lotion, and wrinkle-free cream. That's how we love ourselves. The Bible says, "Love your neighbor in the same way."

After listening to this, the teacher of the law replied, "Well said, teacher...You are right in saying that God is one, and there is no other but him. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding, and with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself is more important than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." (v. 32-33)

Jesus was happy to hear him, so he said, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." (v. 34) The law teacher received a compliment from Jesus. That was the end of all debates in Mark's gospel. "And from then on, no one dared ask him any more questions." (v.34)

That's the end of the story today. Now, it's "So What" time. We will ponder the scripture and apply it to our lives. Are you ready? On three. "SO WHAT~?"

#### Today's "So What" has three short things. **1. Loving God and loving others are one.**

The law teacher asked about the most important one. But Jesus answered with two things: loving God and loving others. Why? Because those two are one in Jesus. Loving God is loving others and vice versa.

Then, why did Jesus say this is first, and this is second? Because it has a cause-and-effect relationship. If you love God, it is naturally exposed as loving others. Just like the two sides of a coin, loving God and loving others are one.

It has a cause-and-effect relationship. If you love God, it is naturally exposed as loving others. 1 John 4:20-21, "Whoever claims to love God yet hates a brother or sister is a liar. For whoever does not love their brother and sister, whom they have seen,

cannot love God, whom they have not seen. And he has given us this command: Anyone who loves God must also love their brother and sister." Therefore, loving God and loving others are one.

**2. The way of loving God and others is the same.** Jesus said you should love God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength. In short, "Love God with all yourself." We don't give him only a small portion of our heart, decision, or life and do whatever we want with the rest of it. No. We give Him all. That's how we love God. // Likewise, when we love others, we should love them as

ourselves, meaning "with all our heart, all our soul, all our mind, and all our strength." We love God and others in the same way.

1 John 3:18 says, "Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth." Loving others with words is easy. Loving others with actions is hard. And loving others in truth is holy. Therefore, brothers and sisters, let's love God and others with words and actions in truth.

Loving words without love are vacant. Charity without love doesn't have power. Even worship without love is meaningless. That's why Jesus told us in Matthew 5:23-24, "Therefore if you are offering your gift

at the altar and there remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there in front of the altar. First, go and be reconciled to them; then come and offer your gift."

What does that mean? Loving in truth is more important than actions/rituals. In today's scripture, the law teacher told Jesus, "Well said, teacher...You are right...To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding, and with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself is **more important than all burnt offerings and sacrifices**." (worship and offering) Jesus was pleased with his words.

So, that's the last "So What" today. **3. Love is more important than worship.** Our worship is to give our love to God in praise, prayer, and offering. Think about it: a proposal without love, a serenade without love, dating without love, or sacrifice without love. Does it sound like happy? No. Not at all.

So, God told the Israelites in Amos 5 like this. "I hate, I despise your religious festivals; your assemblies are a stench to me. Even though you bring me burnt offerings and grain offerings, I will not accept them." (v.21-22). "But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!" (v.24) Let the powerful take care of the weak instead of exploiting them. Let the rich help the poor. Let judges work in righteousness. Love others as yourselves, and come to me and worship.

The world doesn't say we are the disciples of Jesus when they see we worship. Jesus said, "By this, everyone will know that you are my disciples **if you love one another**." (John 13:35). There is a reason. We worship here for an hour at the sanctuary. But, after this worship, when we leave the sanctuary, our worship in life starts. Most of the time, we worship God in our ordinary lives. And the way of worship is love. Therefore, everyone will know whether we are the disciples of Jesus or not by looking at our worship in life.

The world doesn't say we are the disciples of Jesus when they see we worship. Jesus said, "By this, everyone will know that you are my disciples if you love one another." Today, Jesus said that the most important commandment is to love God and others. Jesus lived that way. He didn't love only with words and speech. He loved us until he died on the cross. My beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, let's love

God and others with all our hearts, mind, soul, and strength. Let's worship the Lord at the church and in life so that God may be pleased with us. Let everyone know we are the disciples of Jesus through our love so that we may live in the fullness of joy wherever we are.
